National Significance

The Paul Revere House, home to silversmith, patriot, and industrialist Paul Revere and his family, is the oldest building in downtown Boston.

It is part of a complex of national landmark structures, owned and operated by the Association, that reflect three centuries of domestic history, while serving as a significant educational resource for learners of all ages.

Education Center at Lathrop Place 1835 (A building that served the immigrant community in the North End first as a boarding house for laborers and then as a two family home.)

Courtyard/Gardens/Revere Bell Display/Ticketbooth

Educational Impact

Close to 50,000 Boston Public students served with free programs since 1984.

Over 12,000 youth provided free after school and summer programs since 1990.

Teacher training workshops and resources provided at reasonable cost.

Programs for ESL classes and alternative high school experiences including pregnant and parenting teens pursuing GED.

Community Impact

Active participant in North End community efforts to combat crime, keep the streets and sidewalks clean, develop and share open spaces and retain the qualities that elevate the quality of life for all in the neighborhood.

Free admission for North End residents, community groups and schools.

Collaborative programming with North End groups including the Elliot School, St. John's School, North End against Drugs, North End Music and Performing Arts, and North Bennet Street School.

Major Highlights

The Paul Revere Memorial Association has owned and operated the Paul Revere House as a museum since 1908.

Completed first major capital campaign, exceeded \$4M goal.

Construction underway on new Education and Visitor Center to open in fall of 2016 in a rehabilitated 1835 national register eligible abutting building.

Accredited by the American Alliance of Museums since 1985 (most recently in 2008)

Annually offers a robust schedule of educational programs for learners of all ages including tours of our historic properties, school programs that meet state educational standards and testing requirements, adult lectures, neighborhood walking tours, summer camp and after-school programs, teacher workshops, internships, exhibits, research, publications, and family programming ranging from colonial crafts to concerts.

10th most visited house museum in the country, 7th busiest museum in Boston, the Paul Revere House has welcomed over 12M since opening as a museum.

All operations support our mission: "to share the legacy of Paul Revere, his life, home, and neighborhood by preserving two of Boston's oldest homes and by providing a local, national, and international audience with remarkable educational experiences."

Over \$20,000 in free programs offered annually to Boston public school students and area youth community centers.

Proud tradition of creative collaborations including work with the Institute of Contemporary Art, Boston Landmarks Orchestra, Longfellow House in Cambridge, and the Boston House Museum Alliance.
