Enduring Legacy, Compelling Stories, Transformative Moments



Commemorated the 250th anniversary of Paul Revere's ride on April 18th with a multi-site extensively collaborative event that began with Paul and Rachel at home. A large crowd gathered to watch him depart, walk down to the waterfront,

be rowed across to Charlestown, be greeted in the Navy Yard, walk to City Square, and ride off into history.

Our wonderful partners included: National Parks of Boston, Old North Illuminated, Old North Church, Charlestown Preservation Society, Freedom Trail Foundation, Boston Harbor Now, U.S. Coast Guard, Hull Lifesaving Museum, USS *Constitution* and USS Constitution Museum, National Lancers, City of Boston, MA Department of Conservation and Recreation, Boston Mayor Michelle Wu, and Governor Maura Healy.



Developed a number of other special programs including a kickoff lecture on Paul Revere at the Concord Museum, a Fireside Chat with Paul Revere at the Wayside Inn, a Revolutionary Movie Night with the Friends of Christopher Columbus Park, and a Revolutionary Concert with MA Poet Laureate Regie Gibson.



Published an amazing new work on the Midnight Ride entitled, *Paul Revere's Ride: An Illustrated History*. Its wonderfully precise illustrations by Cortney Skinner are narrated by Paul Revere to create a one-of-a-kind offering.

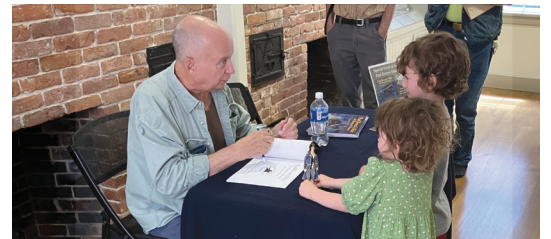
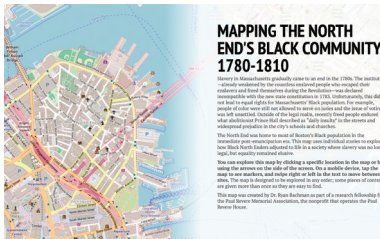


Expanded on the ongoing efforts by a coalition of North Enders to explore, advance, and share stories about the neighborhood's Black residents and workforce. We posted a new blog by our 2024 research fellow Ryan Bachman,

Black North Enders. Current research by our 2025 fellow William Fahey explores the experiences of African Americans, both Loyalists and Patriots, during the Siege of Boston (April 19, 1775 – March 17, 1776).



Hosted Boston teachers for the two-day Trails to Freedom Summer Teacher Workshop along with the National Parks of Boston and its partner sites.

Accepted the offer from the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York to transfer ownership of a 1699 press cupboard on loan to us for over 70 years. The centerpiece of the Hall in the Revere House, this is now a treasured “new” acquisition.



Welcomed Mayor Wu and her family for a tour to announce our participation in the Mayor’s twice-monthly free Boston Family Days for school-age children and two guests.



Featured two new artisans during our Saturday craft programs: Sharon Mehrman for woodworking and furniture making and Jennifer Lee for Native American bark basketry.



Used a new affiliation with Civic Season and an ongoing collaboration with Suffolk University’s summer high school program to expand our outreach to younger audiences, including piloting our own week-long high school internship program.



Co-sponsored The Pursuit of History’s Boston two-day workshop “The Siege and Liberation of Boston.” This included a living history presentation, an exercise with our “Dear Rachel” letter, and a focused tour of the Paul Revere House. These sessions all explored the challenges faced by the Revere family during this difficult time.



Continued to plan and implement essential capital improvements as part of our 250th commemorative celebrations including upgrades to our ticket booth, entrance, and signage; Revere House roof and chimney repairs; improvements to our bell shelter; a ground water engineering study of the Revere House basement; and a climate change risk assessment for our historic site and properties.



Pleased to support and work with the North End Historical Society as they develop a space on Little Prince Street as their long-awaited local museum.
